

On the Study of Mythology...

Recently, it has been noted, more people have been signing up for mythology tests, or running into questions based on mythological facts during tests. To help those unfortunate ones who know nothing or very little about mythology, I have written this article, with my most helpful suggestions. To facilitate learning these stories (for most mythology is story-based), I have broken down study into a few simple steps. Step 1. Read. This is, quite honestly, the only important step one really must do. In light of this, I will be focusing on it. If one reads enough mythology, one will be able to manage the tests easily enough. To aid in reading, here are a few of the best books on the topic. Anything by **Roger Lancelyn Green**. He really is the best author on the topic, head and shoulders above anyone else. If one is a visual person, though, **D'Aulaire's books on Greek or Roman myths** have tolerable illustrations, albeit with rather simplified retellings. There are, of course, other good sources, including the original texts, but those cover broad bases, and one of the two should appeal to everyone. Another important thing to note about mythology is that there is always another version. The stories have been copied and retold so many times, no one agrees completely on all the points. So, the more differing versions read, the better. So, I'll end here, with the reminder to simply read, especially in preparation for the upcoming National Latin Exam.

May your studies provide illumination into the rich field of mythology.

A Word about the NLE...

With the National Latin Exam only a month away, I thought now would be an appropriate time to write something on this subject. First of all, I would really like to emphasize the importance and benefits of taking the National Latin Exams that were administered from previous years. In doing so, you will be able to familiarize yourself with the general structure of the exam and see what kind questions are asked, as well as find out your strengths and weaknesses in the different sections. To access the exams, visit the "Previous Exams" page on the NLE website, or go to this link: http://www.nle.org/exams.html#previousexam. I recommend that you print out all of the exams that pertain to your level, from 1999-2013. Take these, and then compare your answers to the answer key that is provided with each exam. If you are unsure what level you will be taking this year, feel free to email me. Additionally, this year, I have found the *Memoria Press Guide to the National Latin Exam* to have some valuable information concerning the NLE. Having a study guide is, of course, not mandatory, but I think it can certainly enrich your NLE-focused study time! The study guide that I have aforementioned provides lists of vocabulary words to know, important Latin

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sayings, basic Mythology information, Roman history and geography (including maps of the ancient world), as well as conjugations and declensions. If you have any questions regarding this particular study guide and/or how you can order it, please email me! I would, however, like to reiterate that above all, the thing I found key to studying for the NLE last year definitely was taking all of the previous NLEs that corresponded to the level I was taking that year. After I had taken each one, I would go back and check my answers, sometimes writing the question and right answer on a notecard. Then, once I found my weak areas, I specifically worked on those, looking up extra things, and drilling myself on the information.

I hope these few study tips prove to be useful as you endeavor to prepare for the NLE!


